





Ingredients:

1 package (14.3 ounces) Oreo cookies

6 tablespoons butter, melted

1 package (8 ounces) Cream Cheese, softened

1/4 cup sugar

2 tablespoons 2% milk

1 carton (12 ounces) frozen whipped topping, thawed, divided

¾ cup crushed candy cans (about 7 regularsized)

2 packages (3.3 ounces each) instant white chocolate pudding mix 2-3/4 cup cold milk

Directions:

Pulse cookies in food processor until fine crumbs form. Add melted butter; pulse just until combined. Press onto the bottom of a 13X9-in. dish. Refrigerate while preparing filling. Beat cream cheese, sugar, and milk until smooth. Fold in whipped topping and ½ cup crushed candies. spread over crust. Whisk pudding mix and milk 2 minutes; spread over cream cheese layer. Spread the remaining whipped topping. Refrigerate, covered, 4 hours. Sprinkle with remaining candies just before serving.
